here's a reason pickleball is one of the fastest growing sports in America, and believe it or not, it has nothing to do with pickles.

Pickleball is often referred to as a mix between badminton, tennis and ping pong, with elements of each in the game. The short matches can be played solo or with a partner, known as singles or doubles. Played both indoors or outdoors, pickleball consists of a paddle, a plastic ball with holes and a badminton-size court. The net is slightly modified, but other than that, it looks similar to a tennis net.

According to USA Pickleball, the sport was invented in 1965 on Bainbridge Island by Joel Pritchard, Bill Bell, and Barney McCallum, three fathers who created a game for their bored kids during the summer. Since then, pickleball has spread to hundreds of municipalities across the world for all ages to enjoy.

Of these municipalities are many of the towns and villages within Orange

The Town of Crawford offers lessons at the town park.

County. The Village of Walden has already implemented a lined-outdoor court at Bradley Park, but hopes to add more outside and inside. Recreation Coordinator Michael Bliss noted that because of its fast-growing popularity, there is a pickleball demand.

"We do have future plans to line a second and possibly add a third court in the future. We are currently working on setting up indoor pickleball at the Wooster Grove gym for two days a week," Bliss noted, mentioning that he hopes this will happen in the next month.

The rules of pickleball aren't too hard to follow. You have to reach 11 points and lead by two points to win. After the first game ends, players switch sides. Points are earned only by serving, and you can't forget to announce your score prior to the serve. Finally, the serve must be underhand and below the waist. More rules can be found at usapickleball.org/ what-is-pickleball/.

Bliss says Walden typically sees a 40+

age bracket playing. "It's not a high impact sport and you're outdoors, but you do get movement and exercise," said Bliss.

Less than five miles away is the Village of Montgomery, and of course, pickleball has become just as popular there. With a pickleball league four times a week, indoor lessons and

four courts, they have all become pickleball experts.

Montgomery resident Bibi Latif is an active pickleball player and explained just how active Montgomery's pickleball community has become. "They're looking now to build an additional six courts," said Latif, who credits John Tracy as one of the pickleball catalysts.

Tracy brought some pickleball players



from Gold's Gym in Newburgh to the village, and they taught many locals to play pickleball.

Former Montgomery Town Supervisor Brian Maher would also give lessons in the Montgomery Senior Center.

The leagues in Montgomery have different age groups, such as 40-61 and 62 and over. They also have a ladies league, mens league, and a mixed doubles league.

"It's extremely popular. A couple of the guys came up and they told us that they are so happy that we have formed these leagues, and that they're having such a good time. It has really encouraged the seniors," Latif mentioned.

She also noted that pickleball is a very social sport, and that beyond that, it encourages players to explore Montgomery. That being said, Latif believes it can help local businesses as well, as people will explore and support different storefronts and eateries.

Another place where pickleball has

taken off is the Town of Crawford. Here, the community services department hosts pickleball lessons every week. They also have outdoor courts that are used based on a reservation system. Community Services Director



Joan Miller mentions this is both to maintain safety and security of their parks as well as ensure everyone gets to utilize the pickleball courts.

"If it were open play and you wanted to go there with three girlfriends and said 'Hey, let's go Friday at five and play pickleball,' you get down there and all the courts were taken, you won't be able to play. With this reservation system, you can reserve the court and know you will have the court and make plans with your friends to play, which to me is a great benefit," said Miller.

She says there's a wide disparity of ages who play in Crawford, but ages tend to gravitate toward one another.

When considering why pickleball is so enjoyable, Miller mentions things like the social aspect, the ability to play it at your own pace, and a great way to get in shape.

"The sport is accessible to everyone [and] I think that is why it's so popular, Miller says. "It can be played nice and easy, gently, softly or it could be played fast and furiously, depending on who the players are."





To kick off the Hudson Valley's summer performance schedule at Bannerman's Island Castle, local actors, directors and musical performers will present their long working projects with events running now through October.


ccording to bannermancastle.org, Bannerman's Island is a not-forprofit "friends" organization of volunteers working with the New York State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation. The Trust is dedicated to bringing together resources and funding to stabilize the buildings on Pollepel Island.

"NUNSENSE"

The Nunsense Musical off-Broadway show is coming to Bannerman's Island on July 19, 20, 21, 22 and 23 with a rain date of Monday, July 24. Attendees of all ages will cruise over to the island on The Estuary Steward, which leaves from Beacon Waterfront at 6 p.m. and 7 p.m., for one performance at 8 p.m. Both boat rides include a Bannerman Island Lecture. The cost will be \$80 per person for premium seating and \$75 per person for general admission seating. Tickets are available for purchase on bannermancastle.org.

Nunsense tells the story of the Little Sisters of Hoboken who discover that their cook has unintentionally poisoned 52 of the sisters. They need assistance and are



on a race against time to find the necessary means to cover their funerals. The sisters determine that the best way to get money is to perform a variety show in their school auditorium. Here, the audience will meet the rest of the group and see what they do next! The show will include an audience quiz, tap and ballet dancers and comic surprises.

"THE ANASTASIA FILE" BY ROYCE RYTON

The stage reading of Anatasia's File will be read and performed by Brian Petti, Ron Morehead, Emily Clare Zempel and directed by Ron Morehead and Neil Caplan [Director and Founder of Bannerman Castle Trust] on Friday, September 8 and Saturday, September 9 at 6 p.m. and 7 p.m.

The performance consists of only four actors that change roles to convey 45 different characters throughout the show. The story is about a young woman who is discovered by the great-grandson of John Jacob Astor [who was aboard the ship and passed away] on an iceberg over 100 years ago, and only says one word: "titanic." It is now his mission to find out who she is.

"Brian Petti is the local playwright actor playing the inspector and another actress

Emily Clare Zempel is playing our title character and then Audrey and I will split 43 extra characters," said director Ron Morehead. "It's a fun little nugget to wrap it up, we're presenting it as a staged reading which is pretty much how it's written." "It's written with four actors changing on stage, so really the only exception is us with scripts in our hands, but it should be a blast!"




